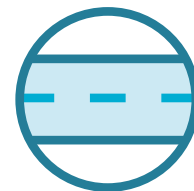

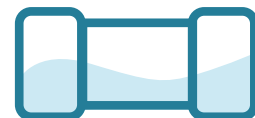

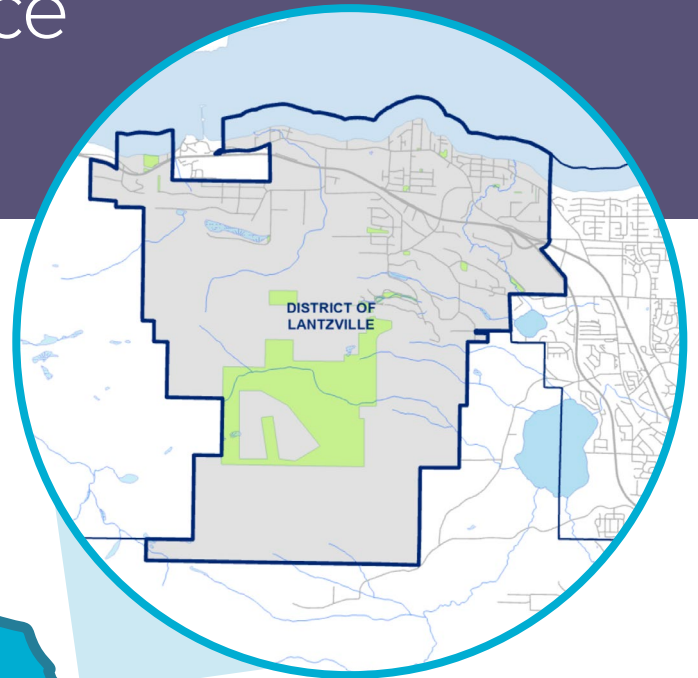

Message from the Mayor



On behalf of Council, I am pleased to present the District of Lantzville's 2025 Annual Report.

This report contains important information about the District's operations, accomplishments, future objectives, and financial performance.

In 2025, the District made progress on a number of key initiatives, a couple of which I want to highlight here:

- The District welcomed a new permanent Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) and Director of Financial Services. Both leadership positions are critical to supporting the work of Council.
- Starting June 30, 2025, the Regional District of Nanaimo (RDN) began handling the bookings at Costin Hall using an online event booking system. We hope this system makes bookings more efficient for the Hall's many user groups.
- The District began working on an Active Transportation Plan to improve walking and cycling connections between neighbourhoods, the village core, and Nanaimo.
- The Planning Department launched the Development Cost Charge (DCC) Bylaw update to ensure that fees collected from developers pay for the increased demand on municipal infrastructure, such as water, sewer, drainage, and parks. The last DCC Bylaw was adopted in 2019 and was due for an update.

- The Coastline Station development officially broke ground and is expected to be completed in 2026. This is Lantzville's first three-storey, mixed-use building. It features 12 residential units on the top floors, 6,000 square feet of commercial space on the ground floor, and an outdoor public gathering space.
- Council unanimously approve Island Health's revised design for a Long-Term Care Facility with just under 300 beds at 6910 Lantzville Road, which is expected to be completed in 2028.
- The District constructed a semi-rural crushed gravel walkway along Lantzville Road, running from Leland Road to Huddlestone Road.
- The infamous patch of lumpy road on Dickinson was fixed via replacing a failing culvert.
- The District was awarded provincial funding to support accessibility improvements at Huddlestone Park.

These are only some of the many positive initiatives happening in our community. Your Council is working hard to ensure that Lantzville will forever remain a great place to live. It is an honour and privilege to serve as your Mayor.

The Municipal Council is Lantzville's governing body. The District's 5-member Council is serving a term expiring November 4, 2026.

Under the *Community Charter*, Council's role is to provide good governance, serve its citizens' needs and wants, steward its public assets, and support a positive economic, social and environmental climate. Council is responsible for establishing priorities and policies and making governance decisions that reflect the best interests of present and future Lantzville residents. Council's work includes setting budgets, levying taxes, adopting bylaws, establishing policies and making decisions that guide the growth, development and operation of the District of Lantzville.

Council Meetings

Council usually meets on the second and fourth Wednesday of every month. Community members are welcome and encouraged to attend open meetings of Council either in person at Council Chambers or remotely on the District's live stream. Meeting agendas, schedules, minutes and video archives are available on the District's website at lantzville.ca.

Council Advisory Bodies

Summary of Municipal Services

Local governments exist to provide essential services, community planning, and local representation. They are mandated by federal and provincial governments to manage local infrastructure – such as water, sewage, roads, and fire protection – while fostering community growth through land-use planning and bylaw enforcement.

The following local services are delivered by Lantzville departments:



Emergency Management and Geographic Information System (GIS) services are delivered by the Regional District of Nanaimo.

Building inspection, bylaw enforcement and animal control are delivered through part-time contract services.

Engineering and some public works services are delivered through contract services.

Departmental Reports



Corporate Administration Department & CAO's Office

The Administration Department is led by the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO), who is Council's single employee and is ultimately responsible for implementing Council's priorities and policies. Administration also includes the Corporate Officer, who fulfils the statutory duties of the corporate officer per section 148 of the Community Charter.

The Administration Department delivers the following functions:

- Organizes and conducts the District's elections and elector approval processes,
- Organizes all meetings of Council and Committees, including preparing agendas and minutes,
- Managing Council meetings,
- Supports Council in developing and tracking progress on its priorities,
- Oversees records management,
- Processes requests for access to records and ensures compliance with Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy policies and legislation,
- Receives and distributes correspondence, including referrals to Council and/or staff,
- Administers leases and agreements for the District,
- Manages District-owned property,
- Manages the District's social media accounts,
- Manages the District's website,
- Issues District newsletters and news releases,
- Delivers human resource services, including recruitment and selection, training and development, employee and labour relations, disability management, and health and safety, and
- Liaises with other levels of government to support District priorities.



2025 Highlights

- Negotiated a new Collective Agreement with the Canadian Union of Public Employees in effect from January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2029.
- Assisted with recruitment for 18 job postings.
- Proposed a new Alternative Notification bylaw to enable more flexibility with advertising requirements.
- Implemented eScribe agenda management software
- Transitioned Costin Hall bookings to be a service provided by the Regional District of Nanaimo.
- Updated Lantzville's policy and bylaw indexes to make documents easier to find and up-to-date.

2026 Objectives

- Administer the local government general election taking place on October 17, 2026.
- Deliver an orientation to the Council elected for the 2027 to 2030 term.
- Develop a Volunteer Program Policy.
- Develop a Council Correspondence Policy.
- Renew agreement with the Regional District of Nanaimo for Emergency Response services.
- Complete updates to a draft agreement with the Coast Emergency Communications Association to improve emergency communications in the region.
- Advance a corporate, long-term financial planning framework to support Council's decision-making, balancing taxation, infrastructure investment, and service delivery through prudent fiscal policy.
- Continue to implement asset management policies and practices that integrate lifecycle planning with financial strategies to ensure sustainable infrastructure investment while managing the impact on taxation.



Financial Services Department

The Financial Services Department is responsible for the financial management of the municipality, payroll and benefits administration, procurement, risk management, and insurance, and is also responsible for the District's Information Technology services. Financial Services leads a number of functions, including:

- Daily billing and collection of all revenues, including property taxes, utility bills, dog licences, business licences, permits and a variety of other fees and charges,
- Investing municipal funds in authorized investments,
- Managing debt-servicing costs, interest charges, transfers to reserves and contingency,
- Long-term financial planning, asset management, equipment replacement planning, and policy development,
- Coordinating the annual budgeting process and preparing the annual financial statements,
- Preparing and managing grant applications, and
- Coordinating the District's information technology services.



2025 Highlights

- Completed software implementation for online tax certificates.
- Updated the internal budget preparation process in preparation for the 2026-2031 financial plan cycle.
- Implemented staff training on the updated budget process.
- Enhanced tracking and documentation of budget changes to support transparency, accountability, and audit readiness.
- Continued review and revision of the Procurement Policy - this will carry forward into 2026.
- Continued review of operational processes to improve efficiency and effectiveness.

2026 Objectives

- Complete a long-term financial planning strategy for funding capital projects.
- Develop a long-term strategy for funding infrastructure and maintenance.
- Evaluate and update user fees and service rates to ensure cost recovery and equity across services.
- Enhance financial reporting for clarity, transparency, and alignment with best practices.
- Modernize financial systems to improve efficiency, reporting and data integration.

Fire Department

The Fire Chief is responsible for:

- Training, education and equipment maintenance for fire personnel,
- Ensuring budgets and operations are managed responsibly,
- Maintaining certifications and accreditations of fire personnel,
- Completing fire inspections on certain commercial, industrial and residential buildings to ensure compliance with the BC Fire Code,
- Overseeing fire ground operations, and
- Fire prevention, acting as local FireSmart representative, and providing public education on fire safety.

In addition, The District of Lantzville contracts with the Regional District of Nanaimo (RDN) for the provision of emergency preparedness, response, and recovery services. Under this contractual arrangement, the RDN provides the District of Lantzville with an Emergency Program Coordinator (EPC) on a permanent basis.



2025 Highlights

- Replaced all hydraulic rescue tools for vehicle rescue.
- Moved the ladder truck into full service and the ladder has been used numerous times to assist in emergency response.
- Recruited 10 new members of the fire service. They are expected to complete their training by the end of 2026.
- Replaced aging fire hose and nozzles.
- Completed 3 community FireSmart education events in different neighbourhoods and one at the Mine Town Day event.
- Worked with schools in the community to promote fire safety.
- Brought back the successful reflective address program with a lot of community uptake.

2026 Objectives

- Complete more community FireSmart activities in different Lantzville neighbourhoods.
- Apply for a grant to continue the reflective address program.
- Purchase each firefighter PFAS-free rescue gear. PFAS refers to forever chemicals that are commonly found in fire fighting gear and are carcinogenic.
- Purchase and install a new washing machine that will remove carcinogens from the firefighters' gear.

Planning & Community Services Department

Planning & Community Services provides planning, economic development, building inspection and bylaw enforcement services for the District of Lantzville. Each of these functions are summarized below:



Planning	Planning includes responding to land development enquiries, processing planning applications, including Official Community Plan and Zoning Bylaw amendments, development permits, development variance permits, temporary use permits, subdivisions and Agricultural Land Commission proposals. Planning also facilitates long range planning initiatives.
Economic development	The primary function of economic development services is to implement the Economic Development Strategy (2018).
Bylaw enforcement	In the Fall of 2020, the District began to provide bylaw enforcement services through a part-time private contractor who provides bylaw education and facilitates enforcement action where voluntary compliance cannot be achieved. Prior to October 2020, bylaw enforcement services were provided by contract by the Regional District of Nanaimo.
Building inspection	The District provides building permit review and inspection services using a part-time private contract Building Inspector. The District transitioned from its contract with the Regional District of Nanaimo to provide building permit and inspection services in Lantzville in 2020. This change reduced processing times for issuance of a Building Permit from around 4 months to 2-3 weeks.

2025 Highlights

- Completed focused review of the Official Community Plan (OCP) for compliance with Provincial housing legislation. This was the first substantial review and update of the OCP since the current version was published in 2019.
- Facilitated approval of the OCP and Zoning Bylaw amendments to allow a long term care facility to move toward construction.
- Following successful implementation of digital applications for Building Permits using Cloudpermit, all Planning permit applications were moved to the Cloudpermit digital portal.
- Working with Koers Engineering, staff completed the background report for updates to the Development Cost Charges Bylaw and presented proposed changes to Council and the community.
- Received 50/50 cost sharing grant for development of an Active Transportation Plan, selected the consultant, and started the planning work, including public engagement.
- After clearing a backlog of bylaw enforcement requests in 2024, a response was provided to all new complaints received in 2025.

2026 Objectives

- Bring the new Development Cost Charges Bylaw to Council for third reading. If it receives third reading, obtain approval from the Ministry of Housing and Municipal Affairs.
- Complete the new Active Transportation Plan.
- Complete a Works and Services Agreement with Island Health for frontage and off-site works for the long-term care facility, including sewer extension; issue building permit(s) as facility design progresses.
- Hold an open house for Community Use Building B (the old church adjacent to Huddlestone Park) to collect community feedback on its future use.
- Hire a summer student to digitize older building permit files, public works files, and other paper records.
- Continue to process planning and building applications in a timely manner.



Engineering & Public Works Department

The District has six full-time employees who support the safe and efficient operation of the District's waterworks, sanitary sewer collection systems, storm drainage systems, parks, municipal buildings, signage and other related facilities and equipment. In addition, a casual on-call employee provides services on an as-needed basis.

This Department's functions are summarized below:

Engineering	Public Works oversees and manages the District's professional engineering agreement with Koers & Associates Engineering Ltd as the service provider. This private company provides engineering expertise to the District as needed.
Transportation (roads and drainage)	The District of Lantzville is responsible for maintaining local roads within its boundaries except for Provincial Highways. The Public Works Department provides limited road maintenance activities such as pothole repairs, signage, and other minor road repair items. Windley Contracting Ltd. is contracted by the District to support the Public Works Departments in larger-scale road maintenance activities.
Waterworks	The District supplies and distributes water to around 1000 connections and is responsible for meeting strict guidelines for drinking water quality.
Sewer collection	The District provides sewer collection services for around 800 connections and is responsible for meeting strict federal and provincial regulations.
Parks and recreation	The Public Works Department maintains 12 parks, 3 playgrounds, 1 community gathering place, 6 facilities and 11 beach access points located at roads ends within the District.



2025 Highlights

- Completion of a gravel/cement multi-use path from Leland Road to Tweedhope Road.
- Replacement of large diameter steel culvert at Dickinson Road with a concrete box culvert. Replacement was required due to the poor condition of the steel culvert.
- Preliminary engineering design for the future replacement of Dickinson Road, including underground infrastructure. Road replacement is needed due to poor asphalt conditions and aging underground infrastructure.
- Preliminary engineering design for the future replacement of two large diameter steel culverts (Lantzville Road at Blood's Creek and Rumming Road) with concrete box culverts. Replacement is required due to the poor condition of the steel culvert.
- Preliminary engineering design for replacement of the watermain, services, and hydrants on Lynn Drive and Millard Drive. Replacement is required because the watermains and appurtenances have reached the end of their service life.

2026 Objectives

- Replace four large diameter steel culverts with concrete box culverts (at Rumming Road, Lantzville Road and Blood's Creek, Dickinson Road and Blood's Creek, and Alger Road).
- Replace Dickinson Road, including underground infrastructure. Road replacement is needed due to poor asphalt conditions and aging underground infrastructure.
- Replace the watermain, services, and hydrants on Lynn Drive and Millard Drive. Replacement is required because the watermains and appurtenances have reached the end of their service life.
- Install additional playground equipment at Huddlestone Park, and install gravel pathway.
- Replace watermain flush-outs at 5 locations. Watermain flush-outs are required to drain dead end watermains to prevent water stagnation.

Message from the Director of Financial Services

Your Worship and Members of Council,

I am pleased to present the District of Lantzville's 2025 Annual Report for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2025.

This report, as required by Section 98 of the Community Charter, includes the audited 2025 financial statements, performance objectives and supplementary information for the District of Lantzville.

The financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2025, were prepared by District staff in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for local governments, as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board (PSAB) of the Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada.

The District maintains a system of internal accounting controls designed to safeguard its assets and to provide reliable financial information. We confirm and test these systems on an annual basis through contracted audit services.

The audit firm MNP LLP, as appointed by Council, is responsible for expressing an opinion as to whether the consolidated financial statements fairly present the financial position of the District of Lantzville and the results of its 2025 operations.

The 2025 audited financial statements were presented and approved by Council on May 20, 2026. At that meeting, MNP LLP presented the results of the audit. They have issued an unmodified opinion for the year ended.

As at December 31, 2025:

- the District had accumulated a surplus of \$80.2 million, an increase of \$1.3 million for the year,
- the District's accumulated surplus is comprised of: equity in tangible assets (\$65.5M in land, park infrastructure, buildings, roads and utility assets), reserves (\$12.1M), restricted operating surplus (\$0.5M), and unrestricted funds (\$2.1M), and
- the District currently holds \$3.7 million of debenture debt for the Sanitary Sewer - Phase III capital project.

The District of Lantzville continues to remain in a strong financial position with all liabilities being fully funded by current cash and investment holdings. The 2025-2029 Financial Plan has been approved by Council and continues to focus on asset management and reserve fund contributions to ensure long term financial stability of the District's infrastructure.

Statement of Responsibility

The accompanying financial statements of the District of Lantzville (the “District”) are the responsibility of the District’s management and have been prepared in compliance with legislation, and in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards for local governments as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board of The Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada. The preparation of financial statements involves the use of estimates based on management’s judgment, particularly when transactions affecting the current accounting period cannot be finalized with certainty until future periods.

The District’s management maintains a system of internal controls designed to provide reasonable assurance that assets are safeguarded, transactions are properly authorized and recorded in compliance with legislative and regulatory requirements, and reliable financial information is available on a timely basis for preparation of the financial statements. These systems are monitored and evaluated by management.

Council meets with management and the external auditors to review the financial statements and discuss any significant financial reporting or internal control matters prior to Council’s approval of the financial statements.

The financial statements have been audited by MNP LLP, independent external auditors appointed by the District. The accompanying Independent Auditors’ Report outlines their responsibilities, the scope of their examination and their opinion on the District’s financial statements. Their opinion is based upon an examination conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, performing such tests and other procedures as they consider necessary to obtain reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free of material misstatement and present fairly the financial position and results of the District in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards.

Independent Auditor's Report



To the Mayor and Council of the District of Lantzville:

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the District of Lantzville (the “District”), which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2025, and the statements of operations net financial assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the District as at December 31, 2025, and the results of its operations net financial assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the District in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the annual report, which is expected to be made available to us after the date of this auditor's report.

Our opinion on financial statements does not cover the other information and we will not express any form of the assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information identified above when it becomes available and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

When we read the report, if we conclude that there is a material misstatement therein, we are required to communicate the matter to those charged with governance.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the District's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the District or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the District's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the District's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Notes of The Financial Statements

For the year ended December 31, 2025, with comparative information for 2024

The District of Lantzville (the “District”) is a municipality that was incorporated on June 25, 2003 pursuant to the issue of Letters Patent dated April 3, 2003. The District operates under the provisions of the *Local Government Act* and *Community Charter* of British Columbia. The District’s principal activities include the provision of local government services to residents of the incorporated area. These services include general government, building inspection, bylaw enforcement, community and development, protective (fire protection and emergency preparedness), environmental (waste, recyclables and food waste collection), public works and transportation, parks and recreation, sewer collection and conveyance, and water supply and distribution services.

1. Significant Accounting Policies

The District prepares its financial statements in accordance with Canadian Public Sector Accounting Standards (“PSAS”), which includes the following significant accounting policies:

(a) Basis of presentation:

The financial statements present the resources and operations including all accounts and funds of the District. All interfund transactions have been eliminated.

(b) Non-financial assets:

Non-financial assets are not available to discharge existing liabilities and are held for use in the provision of goods and services. They have useful lives extending beyond the current year and are not intended for sale in the ordinary course of operations.

(c) Tangible capital assets:

Tangible capital assets are initially recorded at cost which includes amounts that are directly attributable to acquisition, construction, development or betterment of the asset. The cost, less residual value, of tangible capital assets, excluding land, is amortized on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Annual amortization is charged commencing when the asset is available for use. Assets under construction are not amortized until the asset is put into productive use.

When events or circumstances indicate that a tangible capital asset no longer has any long-term service potential, the net carrying amount is written down to the residual value of the asset.

1. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

(c) Tangible capital assets (Continued):

Tangible capital assets received as contributions are recorded at their fair value at the date of receipt and also are recorded as revenue.

(d) Non-financial assets:

(i) Works of art and heritage assets:

Works of art and heritage assets are not recorded as assets in these financial statements as stipulated by PSAS.

(ii) Interest capitalization:

The District does not capitalize interest costs associated with the acquisition or construction of tangible capital assets.

(iii) Leased tangible capital assets:

Leases that transfer substantially all of the benefits and risks incidental to ownership of property are accounted for as leased tangible capital assets. All other leases are accounted for as operating leases and the related payments are charged to expenses as incurred.

(iv) Inventories held for consumption:

Inventories of supplies held for consumption are recorded at the lower of cost and replacement cost.

(e) Debt:

Debt is recorded net of related sinking fund balances held by the Municipal Finance Authority of BC ("MFA").

(f) Employee future benefits:

The District and its employees make contributions to the Municipal Pension Plan. The Municipal Pension Plan is a multi-employer contributory defined benefit pension plan. These contributions are expensed as incurred.

The District also accrues non-vested sick leave. The liability relating to these benefits is actuarially determined based on service and best estimates of retirement ages and expected future salary and wage increases. The liability under this benefit plan is accrued based on projected benefits as the employees render services necessary to earn future benefits.

(g) Revenue recognition:

Revenue is recognized when the performance obligation is satisfied and measurable. Unearned amounts are reported on the statement of financial position as deferred revenue, performance bonds, or deposits.

Annual taxation revenues are recognized in the year they are levied and are calculated using the approved tax rates in the annual tax rates bylaw.

Property taxes imposed by other taxing authorities are not included as taxes for municipal purposes.

Notes of The Financial Statements (Continued)

1. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

(h) Expense recognition:

Expenses are recorded on an accrual basis and are recognized upon the receipt of goods or services. Interest expense on debt is recorded on an accrual basis in accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

(i) Government transfers:

Government transfers are recognized as revenue when the transfer is authorized and any eligibility criteria are met, except to the extent that the transfer stipulations give rise to an obligation that meets the definition of a liability. Transfers are recognized as deferred revenue when transfer stipulations give rise to a liability. Transfer revenue is recognized as revenue as the stipulation liabilities are settled.

(j) Use of accounting estimates:

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts as at the dated of the financial statements, and that affect the reported amount of related revenues and expenses during the reporting period. As such, actual results could differ from the estimates. Areas requiring the greatest degree of estimation include employee future benefit obligations, asset retirement obligations, the estimated useful lives of tangible capital assets and the assessment of contingent liabilities.

(k) Segment disclosures:

A segment is defined as a distinguishable activity or group of activities of a government for which it is appropriate to separately report financial information to achieve the objectives in PSAS. The District has provided definitions of segments as well as presented financial information in segmented format (Note 12 and Schedules B & C).

(l) Contaminated sites:

Contaminated sites are a result of contamination being introduced into air, soil, water, or sediment of a chemical, organic or radioactive material or live organism that exceeds an environmental standard. A liability for contaminated sites is recognized net of any expected recoveries when a site is not in productive use and the following criteria are met:

- (i) An environmental standard exists;
- (ii) Contamination exceeds the environmental standard;
- (iii) The District is directly responsible or accepts responsibility;
- (iv) It is expected that future economic benefits will be given up; and
- (v) A reasonable estimate of the amount can be made.

Notes of The Financial Statements (Continued)

(l) Contaminated sites (Continued):

The liability is recognized as management's estimate of the cost of remediation and post-remediation including operation, maintenance and monitoring that are an integral part of the remediation strategy for a contaminated site. The District has no liability for contaminated sites as at year-end.

(m) Financial instruments:

The District's financial instruments include cash, investments, receivables, accounts payable and accrued liabilities and debt.

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value on initial recognition. Equity instruments quoted in an active market and derivatives are subsequently recorded at fair value as at the reporting date. All other financial instruments are subsequently recorded at cost or amortized cost unless the District elects to carry the instruments at fair value. The District has not elected to carry any financial instruments at fair value.

Unrealized changes in fair value are recognized on the statement of remeasurement gains and losses. They are recorded in the statement of operations when they are realized. There are no unrealized changes in fair value as at December 31, 2025 and December 31, 2024. As a result, the District does not have a statement of remeasurement gains and losses.

Transaction costs incurred on the acquisition of financial instruments subsequently measured at fair value are expensed as incurred. Investment transactions are recorded on the trade date.

All financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis. When a decline is determined to be other than temporary, the amount of the loss is reported in the statement of operations.

2. Adoption of New Accounting Standards

(a) PS 3400 *Revenue*:

On January 1, 2024, the District adopted Canadian public sector accounting standard PS 3400 Revenue. The new accounting standard establishes a single framework to categorize revenue to enhance the consistency of revenue recognition and its measurement. Pursuant to this standard, the change was applied prospectively, and prior periods have not been restated. There was no material impact on the financial statements from the prospective application of the new accounting standard.

(b) PSG-8 *Purchased Intangibles*:

On January 1, 2024, the District adopted Canadian public sector accounting guideline PSG-8 Purchased Intangibles. The new accounting guideline permits recognition of purchased intangibles that are acquired through an arm's length exchange transaction between willing parties provided the purchased intangible meets the recognition criteria for an asset. The adoption of this new guideline did not have an impact on the amounts presented in these financial statements.

(c) PS 3160 *Public Private Partnerships*:

On January 1, 2024, the District adopted Canadian public sector accounting standard PS 3160 Public Private Partnerships. The new accounting standard includes requirements for the recognition, measurement and classification of infrastructure procured through a public private partnership. The adoption of this new standard did not have an impact on the amounts presented in these financial statements.

Investments are comprised of funds invested in the Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia (MFA) short term bond, money market and mortgage funds, as well as a Pooled High Interest Savings Account (PHISA) through a partnership with the Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia and a financial institution. The PHISA offers a convenient way to invest excess cash and offers a highly competitive interest rate, secured principal, and the ability to move funds at any time without penalty regardless of the amount invested.

The annual return on the MFA short-term bond, money market and mortgage funds were 3.89%, ~3.0%-3.5% and 4.75%, respectively, in 2025. The weighted average rate of return on the PHISA funds in 2025 was ~3.2%-3.6%.

7. Pension Plan

The District and its employees contribute to the Municipal Pension Plan (a jointly trustee pension plan). The board of trustees, representing plan members and employers, is responsible for administering the plan, including investment of assets and administration of benefits. The plan is a multi-employer defined benefit pension plan. Basic pension benefits are based on a formula. As at December 31, 2024, the plan has about 256,000 active members and approximately 129,000 retired members. Active members include approximately 45,000 contributors from local governments.

Every three years, an actuarial valuation is performed to assess the financial position of the plan and adequacy of plan funding. The actuary determines an appropriate combined employer and member contribution rate to fund the plan. The actuary’s calculated contribution rate is based on the entry-age normal cost method, which produces the long-term rate of member and employer contributions sufficient to provide benefits for average future entrants to the plan. This rate may be adjusted for the amortization of any actuarial funding surplus and will be adjusted for the amortization of any unfunded actuarial liability.

The most recent actuarial valuation for the Municipal Pension Plan as at December 31, 2024, indicated a \$ 2.67 billion funding surplus for basic pension benefits on a going concern basis. The next valuation will be as at December 31, 2025, with results available in 2025.

The District paid \$132,285 (2024 - \$117,048) for employer contributions to the plan in 2025.

Employers participating in the plan record their pension expense as the amount of employer contributions made during the fiscal year (defined contribution pension plan accounting). This is because the plan records accrued liabilities and accrued assets for the plan in aggregate, resulting in no consistent and reliable basis for allocating the obligation, assets and cost to individual employers participating in the plan.

8. Debt

The District issues debt instruments through Municipal Finance Authority (MFA) pursuant to security issuing bylaws under authority of the *Community Charter* to finance certain capital expenditures.

The District obtained a 25-year debt instrument through the MFA in 2021 for \$4,300,000, pursuant to a security issuing bylaw under authority of the *Community Charter*, to finance capital expenditures for its Sewer Phase III Expansion Project.

The total interest expense on the debt for the year was \$39,130 (2024 – \$39,130).

This debt was refinanced in October 2025 by the MFA, at which time both the actuarial and interest rates changed. The interest rate was changed from 0.91% to 3.03% and the actuarial rate changed from 1.75% to 3.5%.

As a condition of this borrowing, a portion of the debt proceeds is withheld by the MFA in a debt reserve deposit. The District has also executed a demand note in connection with the debt. The demand note is contingent in nature and is not reflected in the financial statements. The details of the debt reserve deposit and contingent demand note at December 31 are as follows:

9. Asset Retirement Obligations

Remediation Assets with Asbestos

The District owns assets that are known to have asbestos and lead paint, which represents a health hazard upon demolition of the asset. There is a legal obligation to remove and dispose of the hazardous materials. Following the adoption of PS3280 Asset Retirement Obligations (ARO), the District recognized an obligation of \$37,790 relating to the removal of the hazardous materials related to these assets as estimated in December 2024. It is highly likely that this ARO asset will be removed in a short period of time; therefore, the net present value method is not used to estimate the ARO asset and liability as the time value of money is negligible.

Well Decommissioning Obligation

The Groundwater Protection Regulation provides specific guidelines for decommissioning wells which give rise to a retirement obligation. The District recognized an ARO of \$75,000 related to ten wells owned by Lantzville that will require decommissioning at the end of their useful lives. Again, the net present value method is not used to estimate the ARO asset and liability as the time value of money is projected to be negligible.

Total estimated costs of \$112,790 have been added to the District’s assets as Asset Retirement Obligations with a corresponding liability, and the ARO capital assets are being amortized on a straight-line basis over their remaining expected useful lives.

12. Expenses by Object and Segment

The District provides a wide range of municipal services. These services have been grouped into related departmental functions or service areas for segment reporting purposes. The District's expenditures by object are reported in Schedule B, which shows the associated revenue and expenses for each segment. The various segments and the associated departmental functions or services are as follows:

General government services:

General government services include all administrative functions of the District including corporate administration, finance, human resources and legislative services.

Building inspection services:

Building inspection services ensure the health, safety, and protection of persons and property by confirming that buildings and their systems generally conform to the BC Building Code and other applicable standards.

Bylaw enforcement:

Bylaw enforcement services include the enforcement of regulatory bylaws.

Community and development services:

Community and development services includes land use planning, subdivision, development, and mapping.

Protective services:

Protective services includes fire protection, emergency preparedness or planning and emergency response.

Environmental services:

Environmental services includes garbage, recyclables and food waste curbside collection services which are contracted to and provided by the Regional District of Nanaimo.

Public works and transportation services:

Public works and transportation services provides for the maintenance and upkeep of the District's infrastructure including its roads, bridges, storm drainage systems, and pedestrian walkways and trails, including the fleet of vehicles required to provide these services.

Recreation and cultural services:

Recreation and cultural services provides for the maintenance and development of all parks and green spaces within the District, as well as the cultural activities which enhance the community.

Sewer:

The sewer function includes the management and maintenance of the sanitary sewer collection system, with the wastewater being conveyed to the Regional District of Nanaimo's sewer treatment plant.

Water:

The water function includes the management and maintenance of the water collection and distribution systems including reservoirs, wells, and hydrants.

13. Commitments and Contingencies

- (a) The Regional District of Nanaimo (RDN) debt, under provisions of the *Local Government Act*, is a direct, joint and several liability of the RDN and each member municipality within the RDN, including the District of Lantzville.
- (b) The District is a defendant in various lawsuits. The District records an accrual in respect of legal claims that are likely to be successful and for which a liability amount is reasonably determinable. The remaining claims, should they be successful as a result of litigation, are recorded when a liability is likely and determinable. The District is insured through membership in the Municipal Insurance Association (MIA) of British Columbia. Under this program, member municipalities share jointly for general liability claims against any member. Should the MIA pay out claims in excess of premiums received, it is possible that the District, along with other participants, would be required to contribute towards the deficit.

14. Canada Community-Building Reserve

The Canada Community-Building (CCB) or Community Works funding (formally known as Gas Tax funding) is provided by the Government of Canada. The use of the funding is established by a funding agreement between the District of Lantzville and the Union of British Columbia Municipalities. Canada Community Building funding may be used towards designated public transit, community energy, water, wastewater, solid waste and capacity building projects, as specified in the funding agreements. The funds are recorded on the consolidated financial statements as a reserve fund.
